

HO-10 Spelling CVC Words with Suffixes

If an ending (suffix) such as -ing, -y, -ed, or -er is added to a CVC (consonant, vowel, consonant; i.e. sit) word, a way must be found to tell it from a 'vowel + e' word with and ending added to it.

Example: hop + ing = hoping (this looks just like 'hope' with the -ing ending because – ing replaces the e in 'hope')

The problem is solved by **doubling up the ending consonant in a CVC word when adding suffixes.** This also happens for CCVC and CCCVC words that have first vowel sounds.

Practice reading these words:

| hop | ho pp er | rip | ri pp ing |
