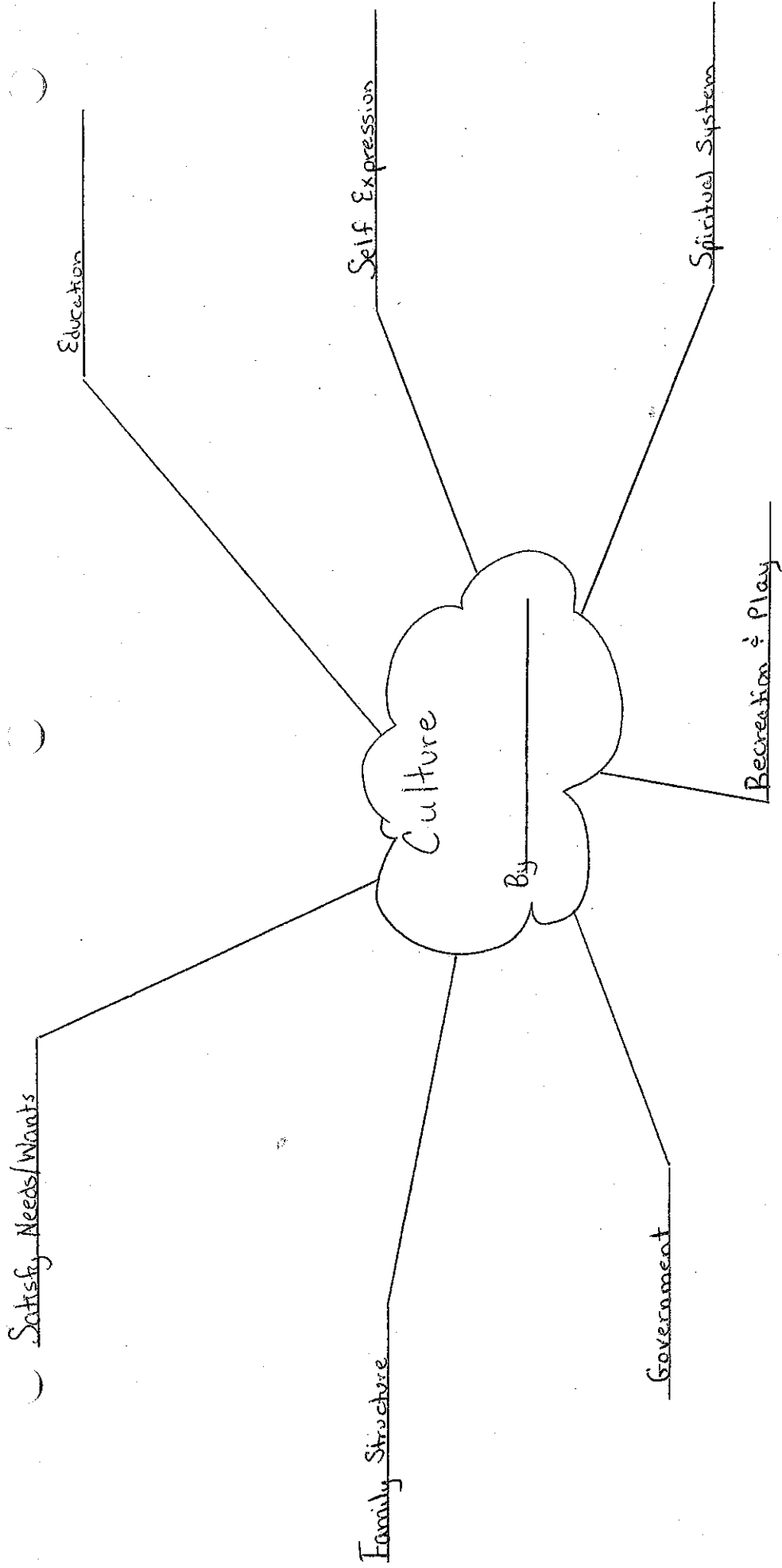


Culture Web

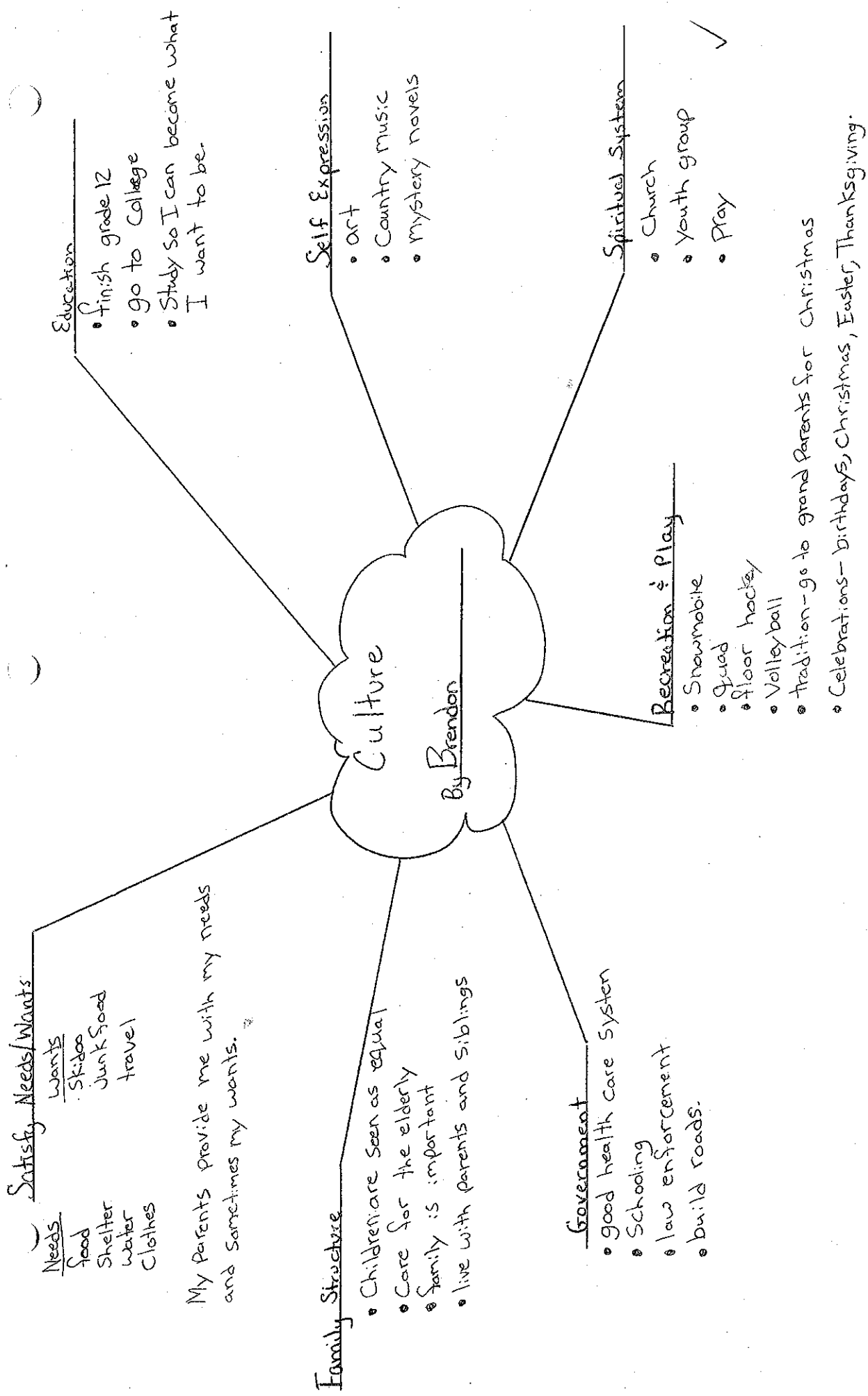

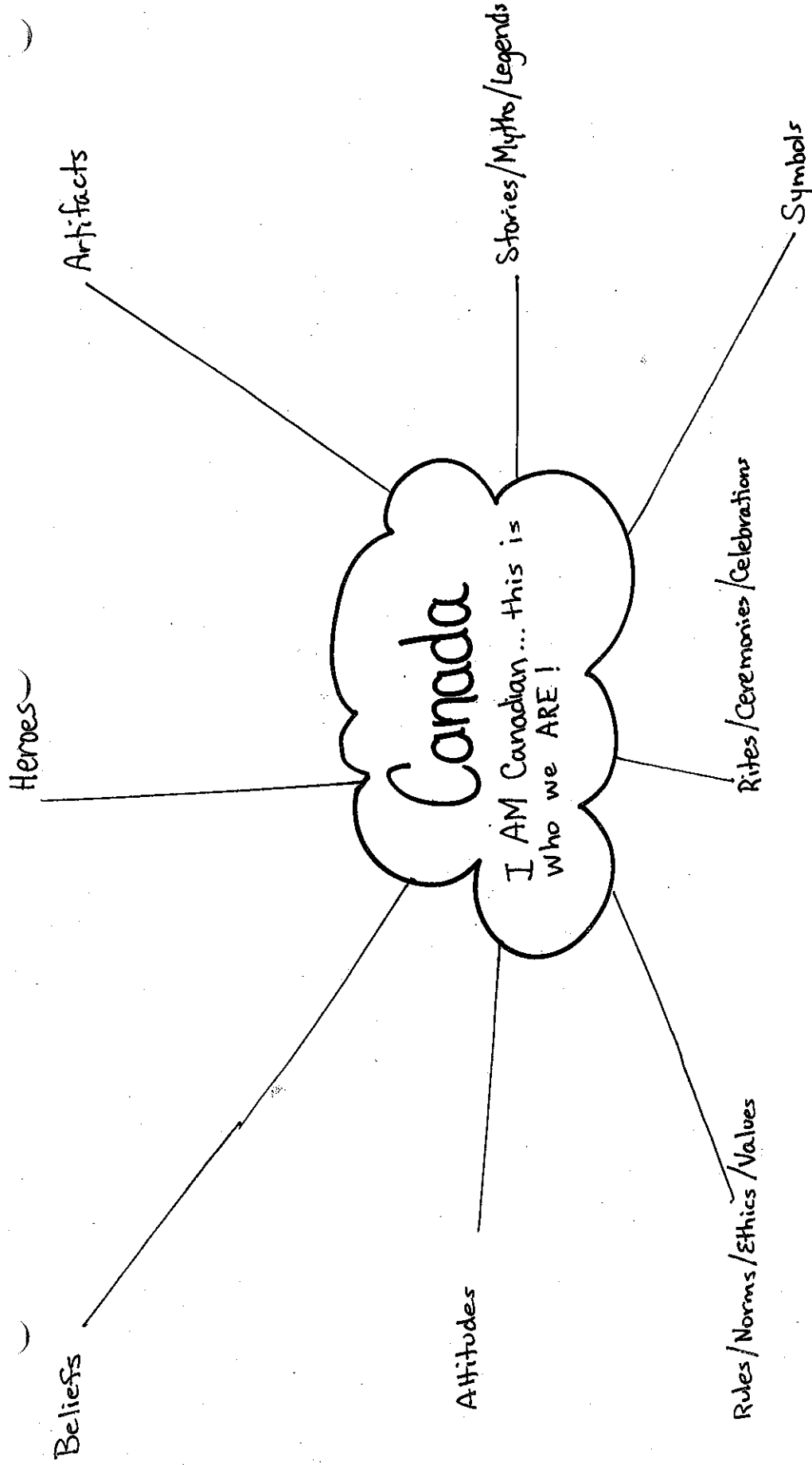
You were given a web that explained the elements of a culture. You have been given a blank web that has the same areas as your informational web.

Symbols

- Used to remind people of rules, beliefs, etc.
- Can show what your status is
- Show correct behavior
- Anything from pictures to handshakes
- Can identify you to people around the world

Beliefs

- the way the group thinks
- all share the same ideas - this can create problems

Attitudes

- how the people of that group show they belong

Rules/Norms/Ethics/Values

- Guidelines which group members must follow or get kicked out
- all of the other areas help set these up

Rites/Ceremonies/Celebrations

- process or actions that are repeated in a specific situation with a specific meaning
- used at a special event or time of year
- they keep the culture going because they are expected and taken seriously

Visual Attributes of Culture

* elements that you can look at and see the culture and see what will keep it going

Heroes

- the perfect person - try to be like them
- they teach good behavior and the proper way things should be
- can be the original person of the group

Artifacts

- used as a reminder of the culture
- a symbol
- could be used in rituals or religious ceremonies

Stories/Myths/Legends, etc

- entertain / teach ~ fact/fiction
- powerful way to show truth
- often good vs. evil

Heroes

- George Beurling: the most renowned pilot during Second world war.
- Nellie McClung: Got the right for women to vote
- Jeanne Mance: He established the first hospital in North America
- Ann Hurley: Saved ship wrecked immigrants from the coast of Newfoundland
