Timely Career Updates from Sun West School Division

All of our schools have slightly different timelines, but our focus is the same. Following are a few highlights of our career-related supports for students:

Course Selection: With a new semester on the horizon, students may be exploring changes or making future choices for their planned high school courses. It is important to consult with Principals and Career Counsellors before making any drastic changes to be certain any adjustments meet needed graduation requirements, fit with personalized plans and align with post-secondary aspirations. There are a number of high school opportunities:

Dual Credits: An opportunity to gain a high school credit and post-secondary credit.

Work-based Learning: This was a very busy semester for students involved in work-based learning courses. A sincere and heartfelt thank you to our local and area businesses who are supporting our various work-based learning courses such as Career and Work Exploration, DLC off-site work-based classes, our Agriculture Equipment Technician program and our Parts Management course.

Apprenticeship Credits: An opportunity for students to earn a wage and gain up to 4 high school Apprenticeship Credits. To be considered, a young person must have paid employment performing trade-specific work under a certified journeyperson. If interested in school credits, he/she can apply to our school division for the possibility of his/her work to earn Apprenticeship Credits.

Career Education 9: All grade 9 students will begin developing a Graduation and Post-Graduation Plan using myBlueprint. Students utilize this tool to learn more about their learning styles, understand personality types, set life/career goals, investigate occupations, etc. Parents are key influencers in the life/career decisions of youth and can gain access to this resource. If interested, please contact your Career Development Teacher.



Grade 10 Students: Grade 10 students will progress with life/career investigations utilizing the myBlueprint planning program as an ePortfolio tool. They will be revisiting inventories, reflecting and updating goals, and continuing to investigate various options as part of their Grad and Post-Graduation Plan. These investigations along, with career conversations with the school's Career Counsellor, can help students explore possibilities such as high school courses, post-secondary studies, gap year possibilities, travel options, leadership opportunities, etc.

Grade 11 Students: Grade 11 students will be completing the CAPS/COPS/COPES career assessment inventories to help them further explore their interests, values, and skills then examine how their personalized strengths and interests align with various occupations. This is another career planning tool our school division provides in support of life/career explorations. Grade 11's may also want to consider attending post-secondary information sessions open to high school students to help make decisions about future possibilities.

Grade 12 Students: This is a very important time to continue to research and make informed life/career decisions for the first steps upon graduation. Scholarship opportunities still exist! Interested in seeking \$\$? See scholarship section of this newsletter. If students have applied for post-secondary institutions, a transcript request may have to be sent.




Transcript Requests: For any students applying for post-secondary institutions, you may need to send a transcript that indicates the subjects you have taken. Most institutions will require you to request [transcripts from the Ministry of Education](#). There is a nonrefundable search and process fee involved. Students can select up to 5 requests (including sending to self) for this fee. Students will require personal information, Saskatchewan Learning ID (if known), valid credit card and card holder information if paying online, valid email access, etc. before beginning the process. Talk to your Career Counsellor if you have any questions.

If you are in Grade 12 and haven't made any decision about life following high school, don't panic, but please dedicate some time to research and reflect on possibilities. Ask for assistance from parents, family, friends, teachers, career counsellors, community members, etc. in support of your life/career investigations. Accessing your Allies is an important part of the career planning process.

Thoracic Surgeon – involves operative care of conditions in the chest.


Dietitian – evaluate health of clients and help develop eating plans to meet health goals.


