Level 1

Limited: makes simple unsupported inferences and interpretations; may be illogical

Partial: makes and supports simple, reasonable inferences and interpretations with some specific evidence.

Highly effective: makes and supports logical, insightful inferences and interpretations with specific, convincing evidence.

- The ships were ~~are~~ unable to see one another in the impenetrable fog, making communication and signalling almost useless. The fog caused the tragic accident to occur because visibility and communication were disabled.
